- By bringing together a range of different programmes the Commission hopes to make the funding programme more efficient/accessible.

Sport

The new programme is for organisations across all sectors actively involved in delivering formal and non-formal education and training, youth and sport activities.

A new approach to funding for education and training

- Erasmus+ will be an *integrated* programme based around actions rather than sectors of education.
- More flat rate grants will be used to increase efficiency/simplification for beneficiaries in the management of the programme.
- Some activities funded under the Lifelong Learning Programme have disappeared; others have been translated into the new Erasmus+ structure.

Erasmus+ will fund three Key Actions across education, training and youth:

1. **Learning Mobility** of Individuals
2. **Co-operation** for Innovation and Good Practices
3. Support for **Policy Reform**

There are also specific actions for **Jean Monnet Activities** and **Sport**.

Links to EU policy

Erasmus+ has been designed to reflect European policy priorities including:

- youth unemployment
- helping people make the transition from education to work
- reforms to modernise and improve the quality of education in Member States

Erasmus+ is a 7 year programme which will run from the beginning of 2014 to the end of 2020 and all projects should link back to the main Europe2020 strategy as well as referencing other EU strategies/priorities from the list above.

Programme budget

- Programme budget allocation of €14.7 billion for seven years (2014-2020)
- 40% increase compared with current programme

Of the €14.7 billion budget the breakdown is as follows:

- Education and training (77.5%)
- Youth (10%)
- Jean Monnet (1.9%)
- Sport (1.8%)
- Other (8.8%)

Education & Training budget

- Higher Education (43%)
- Vocational Education & Training (22%)
- Schools (15%)
- Adult Education (5%)
- Unallocated (15%)

How will the Programme be managed?

- Mix of **decentralised** activities (National Agencies) and **centralised** activities (European Commission's Executive Agency).

The opportunities managed by the National Agency in each participating country will be:

- **Key Action 1:** Learning Mobility of Individuals (Mobility for learners and staff)
- **Key Action 2:** Co-operation for Innovation and Exchange of Good Practices (Strategic partnership projects)
- **Key Action 3:** Support for Policy Reform (Youth Structured Dialogue)

Who can participate in the programme?

- organisations active in education, training, youth and sport
- In a change from the previous programme, applications need to be from an organisation rather than at an individual participant level.

- Programme countries
- Partner countries
